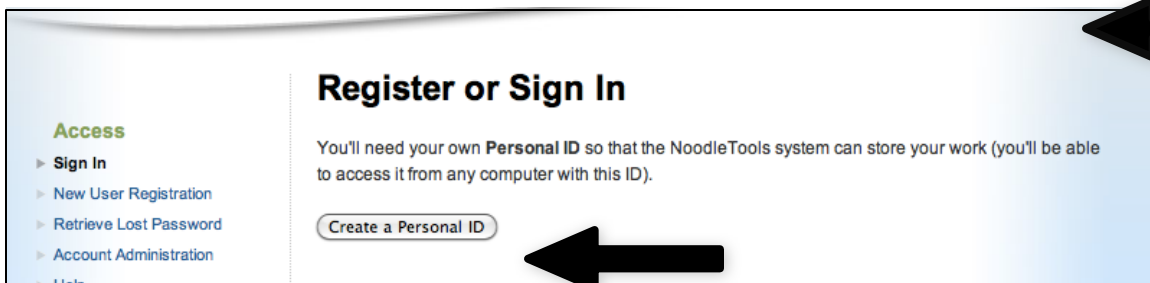


Using NoodleTools: Registering, Citations, and Annotations

NoodleTools is a fantastic research project organizer. It will help you keep track of your research question, notes, citations, annotations, and even allow you to share your progress with your teachers. You'll be using this resource throughout your years at the Academy, so it's important that you become familiar with this resource now.

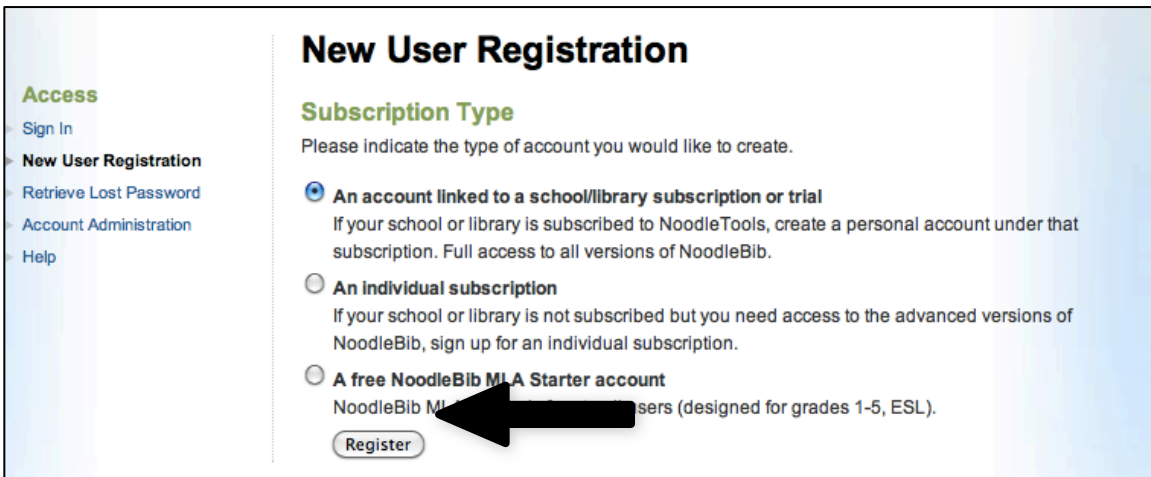
Getting Started:

1. Start by going to www.noodletools.com. Click "Current Users: Sign In."



2. Then click "Create a Personal ID".

3. On the next page, leave the top option selected and click "Register".




4. Enter the school user name and password and click "Sign In."




Click "Create a New Project" to get started.

Components:

To start your Works Cited, click on Bibliography in the Components area. This will bring you to your Works Cited page.

To add sources to your list, select the type of source from the drop down menu. To cite sources from Facts on File or Gale World History (which is where you will find your sources for this first project) choose **Reference Source** and click "Create Citation."

- an encyclopedia entry

- a dictionary definition
- a map in an atlas
- a chart in an almanac
- a photograph or illustration
- a free reference work online like *Dictionary.com* or *Wikipedia*
- a subscription reference database like *The Oxford English Dictionary* or *Encyclopaedia Britannica*
- a reference source on CD-ROM

Citing the source:

All of the information you need to complete the citation is found at the end of the Facts on File or Gale World History source.

Enter the author’s name (if a source has more than one author, enter all names). Make sure you click “Add”. **PAY ATTENTION TO CAPITALIZATION.**
